We offer a very warm welcome to everybody here at the CR MOT Centre Community Stadium at the Lamb this afternoon for this Pitching In Southern League Premier Central fixture. In particular we trust the players, supporters and officials from our visitors Biggleswade Town enjoy the hospitality offered to them today and they have a safe journey back down the A14 following the game. It is a strange quirk of the fixture list that we entertain The Waders so close to our away league game with them less than a fortnight ago, so the players will be no strangers to each other!

We have hit on a difficult patch of form of late and pulling out a win has been hard to come by. We know that the Management Team is doing everything they can to put things right on the field of play. Since our last game at the Lamb we have signed two players on loan - Matt Stenson from AFC Halifax Town and Liam Cox from Northampton Town. Both players impressed in their debut at Biggleswade Town and Matt Stenson has gone on to record two goals in two games. We have also welcomed back leading scorer Dan Creany who has been out since our FA Cup defeat and he is getting his fitness levels back up to speed.

The performance at Alvechurch on Tuesday evening was certainly a game of two halves. A poor first 45 mins saw the 'Church gain a two goals advantage which left us a mountain to climb facing a very strong wind. Matt Stenson gave us hope with a good strike, but despite some good chances towards the end of the game we were unable to get a point. Joint Manager Gary Smith expressed his frustration in his post match interview, "We were poor in the first half, especially in terms of the goals we conceded. We had harsh words at half time and then the difference which is so frustrating! That is what we have in our dressing room - we showed a lot of character and desire and showed that we can play football. We were very unlucky in the end not to get a point, which is so frustrating."

The Waders have played one game since we faced each other, ironically this was also against Alvechurch! They faced the Worcestershire outfit last Saturday with the game ending in a 1 - 1 draw. The men in green have visited the Lamb twice in league encounters, with Tamworth winning both games - a 4 - 0 victory in February 2020 and a 3 - 0 triumph in October 2020. We will certainly be looking for a similar result this afternoon in order to kick start our season!

The visit of Ron Atkinson to the Lamb Clubhouse last Friday evening was a great success and we were delighted to present the footballing legend with our partners Leisure Leagues. We are now looking to host a similar event in the new year with a speaker from the footballing world, so keep your eyes posted to the Tamworth FC website for more details as they are released.

Tamworth Women are currently on an excellent run of form in their league. After an indifferent start to life in a higher league they have won their last three league games and are now only 4 points behind the league leaders. Tomorrow afternoon they face Lichfield City Women here at the Lamb and the team would really value your support. MATCH REPORT

ALVECHURCH FC 2-1 TAMWORTH FC

On the Lye Meadow bi-directional sloping pitch, and with only three floodlights shining until just before kick off, Tamworth, in the red and black kit, lined up against the home yellow and black who included former Lambs Claudio Dias and Dan Jezeph in their starting line up, before getting the game underway, attacking the car park end of the ground in the first half. Creaney and Stenson lined up on opposite sides up front with Waite in between and the former two quickly switched around when a freekick from Cox was punted into the final third but came to nothing. A deep freekick from Beswick on 3 took a touch behind for a corner on the left and Yeoman's shot from outside the area was charged down and cleared. Pendley had to think quickly to nip the ball off the feet of Skeen-Hamilton for a home corner on the left on 5 which The Lambs defended strongly for another corner on the right which went back to Singh and his long kick bounced for Jezeph to gather in his own box. Jezeph then denied Stenson with a well timed close range block as the striker tried to get a shot on the angle from the left if the box on 7. On 11, Cox launched himself at a cross form the right by Cassidy and headed it behind for a right sided corner which home captain Willets did similarly with an equally acrobatic full length dive to connect with the ball, and he failed to hit the target with his powerful headed effort. Cassidy thankfully left his shooting boots at home on 16 firing high and wide of target from 20 yards out when his position and space probably deserved an on target shot as a minimum. Skeen-Hamilton's ball from the left had to be dealt with at the near post on 19 but nothing could be done about the neat passing between Cassidy and Dias which allowed the former to drive home from 18 yards after a neat one two, into the bottom right past Singh (0-1, 19 mins) The Lambs nearly released Stenson via a Shaw ball down the left wing on 22 but it was just too strong for him to latch onto before Jezeph could get to it in the area and a quick break by the home side resulted in a half chance blasted high and wide from distance. Alvechurch continued to go in search of a second goal, and it took a number of bodies in the way to deny a powerful strike from McIntlock on 25, before Waite eventually got the ball away from danger. However, The Lambs were quickly pressed back into the final third again and on the half hour Brown shot low but also wide of the left hand upright with a diagonal shot which drew Singh into a dive, more to protect the ball from clipping his post than going in the goal itself. A good spell of possession out of midfield ended on 35 with Creaney rolling the ball down the right wing for Yeomans, but his cross curled over and out of play, but almost as if in response Alvechurch doubled their lead on 36 with a low finish from Burton from the left of the area after The Lambs defence had failed to clear their lines and it was a case of who would score, not when (0-2, 36 mins) A freekick on the Alvechurch left ended with a booking for Beswick on 43 in the play after the deadball restart, and from the second attempt at the freekick 'Church forced a corner on the left with a low blocked shot. In added time a deep freekick bounced past Creaney and out for a goalkick before the referee

Tamworth emerged from the changing rooms a minute or two before their hosts onto the blustery storm whipped pitch, while the food van did a brisk trade in hot goods, and The Lambs duly got the game back underway. Alvechurch had the best chance in the early exchanges when Dias' right sided angled shot took a deflection past the far post for a left sided corner on 47 which came to nothing when a foul in the area halted play. A powerful clearance from Cox on the right on 52 gave Stenson the ball on the edge of the area but he was unable to get a shot past the covering defenders despite his best efforts. At the other end, on 55, Church forced a couple of flagkicks on opposite sides in quick succession but the second was blocked and cleared with Creaney and Yeomans working hard to keep the ball up at the business end of the pitch and it fell well for Stenson on the edge of the area, but his right footed strike went wide of the mark and then Singh was called upon to bat away a right footed strike on target on 59 by McIntlock from 18 yards. Clement replaced Yeomans for the final half hour and a corner resulted on the right when Hart overlapped down the right and saw his cross blocked, but he had to leave the field to receive treatment for a nose-bleed when the flagkick came into the box and Clement saw his shot denied by a defensive boot. The Lambs did pull one back on 66 though, after Pendley had nodded a high ball down into the path of Stenson in the left of the area, and he fired home with a clean but half power shot that beat Jezeph at his near post. (1-2, 66 mins) This gave Tamworth a renewed sense of purpose, and a forward push earned a left sided corner on 67 which was headed away and out past the far post to give Beswick another chance with the dead ball but this time it was cleared. The home side did their best to get straight back down the other end and it took a brave last ditch tackle from Cox to deny a clean shot from Skeen-Hamilton on 70, which resulted in the ball ballooning high and wide of the mark. Creaney put his header from Hart's right sided cross straight into the hands of a grateful Jezeph on 71 and knew that a yard either side would have seen him net the equaliser before McDonald and Jones replaced Waite and Shaw with 15 to play. Creaney tripped Brown in the left channel on 77 and it set up McIntlock with a chance of a free shot from 25 yards which he took and forced Singh to parry the on target strike, one handed, over the bar for a corner. Turton sent the deadball onto the head of Beswick though and Stenson managed to get all the way into the opposition box before a pull on a defenders shirt, spotted by the linesman on his side of the field, halted his surging run. When Hart and Brown clashed unwittingly in the middle of the park the Tamworth man was OK to continue, but even with the help of the physio, it took a while for Brown to get back to his feet and he had to be replaced for the final minutes of the game and Alvechurch forced a corner on the left from the restarted play and Turton again sent it short but The Lambs were able to break through Creaney and McDonald who found substitute Jones who headed wide of the mark. Tamworth kept the ball in the home half and worked it through to Clement who struck low from 20 yards on 87, but Jezeph was equal to it as the minutes ticked down on hopes of rescuing an away point ahead of two vital home games against Biggleswade and Rushden and Diamonds before a trip to bottom club Hitchin. Five minutes added time were shown at the end of the second half, and Creaney nearly set up McDonald in the area but it was nipped off the latter's toes before he could get a shot away. Hart saw his shot on the right charged down at the near post by the home defence but the final chance of the game fell from Hart's cross from the right onto the head of Creaney and he just couldn't get it to drop under the bar or inside the post and Alvechurch escaped a last minute equaliser.

THE CHANGING FACE OF THE LAMB



Since the start of last season there have been some big changes at the Lamb which you can't help but spot. The 9 ageing and second hand floodlight columns have been replaced by 4 brand new state of the art LED floodlight towers. The lights are brighter and cheaper to run, and with the facility to dim them, they are suitable for use in a number of different situations.

Another major change is the investment in the clubhouse, identifiable by the refurbished roof and a redeveloped internal space following considerable damage caused by the winter weather. All in all just over £250,000 has been invested in the ground with a substantial amount provided by grants from the Football Stadia Improvement Fund and the generosity of supporters and backers of the club.



Since 2016 the Lamb has moved from a facility that was used two nights a week and a Saturday afternoon to a seven-days-a-week all year-round operation. The club has grown from one competitive team to 25 teams ranging from under-7s to the first team. There is also a full-time scholarship programme for 60 students aged 16-19. A women's section has been introduced with junior and adult teams. As a result, Tamworth FC is now the largest multi-team football club in the area with our academy in a partnership with Derby County.

The Football Stadia Improvement Fund (FSIF) is the largest funder of non-league football in the country. The FSIF is the sister organisation of the Football Foundation and is solely funded by the Premier League. It is the country's largest provider of grants towards projects that help improve the comfort and safety of lower-league football grounds in both the professional and amateur game. These improvements range from new football stands and turnstiles to flood-lighting and improved provision for disabled supporters.

BIGGLESWADE TOWN

Biggleswade Town were originally formed as Biggleswade F.C. in 1874 and began by playing friendlies.

They became one of the founder members of the Biggleswade and District League in 1902/03 and won the championship at the first attempt. The successful season was climaxed by winning the Bedfordshire Senior Cup - the first of eight victories so far in the competition. The 'Waders', as the club are known, first entered the FA Cup in 1904.

Chris Nunn became manager in 2006 after a very poor start to the season saw the team heading for certain relegation. By February 2007 the team had made up a lot of points but were still bottom of the Premier table. The team avoided relegation on the last league day of the season. The winning of the NBC Cup in the very last match of the campaign reinforced that optimism. The 2007/08 season saw the squad develop further with new signings and for the first time in 15 years the club found itself top of the division at one point. A final position of third was a result of hard work and changes gradually moving the club forward. As the 2008/09 season beckoned, the new Stadium was ready for occupation and the seasons in the 'wilderness of ground sharing' were over. For the first time in the club's 134 year history, it finally had a home of its very own. The Waders' first season (2009-10) at Step Four proved a tough start but gradually the team strengthened and finished in a comfortable 12th place with the team taking points off every side that season except Bury Town and Hitchin Town who finished first and second respectively. The 2010-11 season saw the Waders climb to their highest ever position in the football pyramid, finally finishing in fourth place and with the resultant position in the play-offs. Waders travelled to third place Daventry Town, a team they had previously beaten both home and away in the regular season. Football being football, Daventry ran out easy winners ending Waders hopes of promotion. The following season saw the Waders fade as the campaign progressed. Having topped the league early in the season, injuries and suspensions took its toll and the season finished with a top half finish just outside the play-offs. Winning the 2012-13 play-off final secured a place in the Southern League Premier, was upstaged by the best-ever season in the club's 140-year history, finishing ninth in our first Premier season and reaching the First Round Proper of the FA Cup, losing to a well organised Stourbridge side. The season ended with Waders beating Luton Town to lift the County Cup. The Waders began establishing their Premier status and went on to achieve their highest points total in 2016-17, finishing just outside the play-offs in a creditable seventh position. The 2018-19 campaign proved a success for new manager Lee Allanson and his new squad. Winners of the Beds senior cup, they also finished seventh in the Southern Central Premier division, narrowly missing a play-off place. Following a disruptive 2019-20 season including the loss of Lee Allanson and most of the squad to Hendon, Waders appointed former manager Chris Nunn in caretaker role to see the season out. He was re-appointed full-time manager for the 2020-2021 season, bringing in Scott Davies and Russell Short as assistants with the Waders looking to enjoy a positive campaign.

NON LEAGUE ROUND UP WITH MARK MAYBURY

Aram Solomon, who started the season with Tamworth, has signed for Redditch United. Following his departure from the Lambs he signed for Matlock Town but within a week returned to former side Guiseley! In October he signed for rivals Hednesford Town but now signs on for United. Also joining Redditch is Jamie Asmore from Sutton Coldfield Town. 25 years old Ashmore returns to the Trico Stadium from the Northern Premier League Division One Midlands side, where he had been since late October after arriving from Redditch's league rivals Alvechurch. He had signed for 'Church in August from another league rival, Barwell. Ashwell started his career with Walsall and has enjoyed spells at Bedworth United, Sutton Coldfield, Alvechurch and Redditch.

St Ives Town, who caused a shock last Saturday by inflicting Banbury United's first league defeat of the season, have added to their squad. Defender Sidik Atcha, 20, is a former Hemel Hempstead Town and Boreham Wood youngster. He moved to the Corby Town academy then in October 2020, before signing for Southern Division One Central side Kempston Rovers and then in February 2021 he went over to join Lada Bilgoraj to play in Liga 3 in Poland, but due to family reasons returned to the UK. Chris Manangu is a well-travelled 29-year-old from Kempston Rovers, where he had been since August. He was in West Ham United's academy as a youngster and then joined Liverpool following a successful trial in 2008. Failing to get a professional contract he returned to his East London roots and played for Brentwood Town, Grays Athletic, Ilford and Thamesmead Town. He was then given an opportunity to play in Cyprus for Apoel Nicosia and after a year, returned home and turned out for Tooting & Mitcham United. He also enjoyed a couple of seasons with Swedish side Ytterhogdals IK.

Stourbridge have been busy bringing in new players to their squad. Making their debuts for Stourbridge in their win against Needham Market were two new defenders in Marshall Willock and Kyle Rowley. Willock is a 21-year-old centre-back who joins the Glassboys from league rivals Redditch United, where he had been since August. Willock is a product of the Solihull Moors academy having been released from a similar position at Walsall. The 6'4" defender has represented Montserrat at international level, winning his first cap when he came on as a sub against El Salvador in November 2019. Kyle Rowley has signed from league rivals Hednesford Town, where he had been since October 2020. The centre-back, is also a former Walsall trainee, and has played for Walsall Wood, Stratford Town and Alvechurch.

Stratford Town have signed two new goalkeepers after an injury to regular custodian Liam O'Brien. Joining the Bards for a month's loan from Championship side Queens Park Rangers is their under-23 keeper Murphy Mahoney. The 19-year-old will stay at the Arden Garages Stadium until January 1st, where he will link up with former R's assistant manager and Blackburn Rovers goalkeeper Tim Flowers - who was appointed Stratford boss two weeks ago. Flowers has also signed the more experienced Richard Walton who has also played for Tamworth. The 24-year-old has been with AFC Rushden & Diamonds since the summer of 2020 having joined from Tamworth. Walton is a product of Lincoln City's academy and was a member of the squad that were promoted to the Football League.

Royston Town have brought in two players to strengthen their promotion push. First up is skilful Portuguese player Bruno Tavares. The 22-year-old joins from Vanarama National League South side Hungerford Town for whom he had signed in August after scoring against them for League Two Swindon Town whilst on trial at the County Ground in pre-season. The Crows have also signed young Louis Tigwell from Southern Division One Central side Barton Rovers. The 18-year-old developed in Rovers' youth team before moving up a level to join Royston.

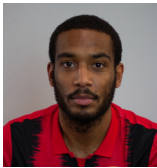

THE NON-LEAGUE PAPER



ESSENTIAL READING FOR FOLLOWERS OF THE NATIONAL GAME

MANY football supporters hope their favourite Christmas present arrives on Boxing Day – in the shape of three points.

Two Non-League sides Sheffield FC and Hallam FC – the world's oldest and second oldest clubs – are the reason the game is played over the festive period.

Hallam hosted their neighbours in the first ever inter-club match on Boxing Day 1860, also known as St Stephen's Day.

The Football League helped continue the tradition in their inaugural 22-game season in 1888-89 when Preston North End defeated Derby County 5-0 on December 26th.

The ceasefires during World War I, particularly on Christmas Day in 1914 when British and German troops played football together, are also said to have strengthened the game's festive legacy.

Matches were even played on December 25th until 1965 when Blackburn beat Blackpool 1-0 in the First Division and Coventry beat Wrexham 5-3 in the Third.

In 1913, Liverpool beat Manchester City 4-2 on Christmas Day, lost the return game 1-0 on Boxing Day, before drawing 3-3 at home with Blackburn Rovers the next day!

In Europe, it is common to have a winter break over the festive period. The Premier League has recently introduced a winter break which this season takes place in January.

The top-flight has maintained its Boxing Day fixture schedule as has the Football League but the picture is slightly different within Non-League.

The National League, North and South will play on Sunday, December 26th this year and then on Tuesday 28th before playing again on Sunday, January 2nd.

The Isthmian League, Northern Premier League and Southern League – at Steps 3 and 4 will not play on Boxing Day, competing on Monday, December 27th instead.

They will, however, play on New Year's Day and then on the Bank Holiday Monday, January 3rd.

With the majority of clubs at Steps 3 and 4 part-time, and given the difficulties faced over the past two seasons, having a Boxing Day off seems a sensible decision.

Clubs at these levels and below rely on volunteers with players and managers balancing their playing commitments with full-time work.

The differing schedules across the National League System will be welcome news to groundhoppers too, who will almost be able to watch a match-a-day during the winter period, while crowd sizes are likely to receive the usual boost with matches taking place on Bank Holidays.

It wouldn't feel right if Boxing Day football was completely abandoned but it's a good move from leagues to be looking after those who keep the game going.

The Non-League Paper will be published as usual throughout the Christmas period.
